

UPDATE ON HABITAT CONSERVATION & MANAGEMENT

Knob Armor: The armor will require a renewal of chinking and regular maintenance.

Fencing: We repaired and replaced fencing on the Knob.

Five-year Plan: We are working to obtain a consulting proposal to develop a five-year plan for the Knob. As usual we are doing this together with Salt Pond Areas Bird Sanctuaries and the Quissett Harbor House Land Trust.

In addition to working with Entrepreneurship Ventures, Laura serves as a trustee of the Museum of Science in Boston and of the Massachusetts General Hospital's Physician's Organization. She is also a member of Hestia, a Giving Circle that makes direct investments in programs for Boston's children.

While she considers herself semi-retired, Laura, along with Ken, travels frequently, often to Spain. However, she said, they have agreed to "always spend the summer months in Quissett." That is when they can spend quality time with their two daughters, Allison Morse, an avid sailor, and Amy Morse Winslow, as well as with Amy's family (husband Toffer; daughter Hadley, age 11; and son Nate, age 9). A civil engineer,

Randy served with the United States Navy Seabees in the Philippines, Thailand, Okinawa, Taiwan, Viet Nam and Washington D.C. As Secretary of Economic and Employment Development for Governor William Schaefer of Maryland, he helped set regulations for waterside development and wetlands, and he was involved in the effort to save Chesapeake Bay.
